The Blessing

What is a blessing? Why might you bless someone? Is it only God or religious people who can bless people? Can you bless yourself? Blessing isn't a word which young people tend to

use very often, but I wonder what pupils think it means. Could pupils try to write a blessing of their own for their families or for the world?

<u>The Blessing</u> is a song written by American Christian songwriters and released in early 2020, just before the Covid-19 pandemic hit. Within weeks, as we went into lockdown, it had been performed and recorded by a group of 65 churches from all over the UK, going viral in May 2020, quickly reaching more than 2.5 million views. Since then, it has been performed by 10s of thousands of people in 257 different languages, all around the world.

Knowledge in RE



In specifying the intent and implementation for your curriculum, it is important to consider what is meant by 'knowledge' in RE. The 2021 <u>Ofsted</u> research review identifies 3 types of knowledge in RE.

- 1. Substantive knowledge: having an understanding of different religious and non-religious traditions. *How do people express religion and non-religion in their lives?*
- 2. Disciplinary knowledge (ways of knowing) is about 'how to know' about religion and nonreligion. What tools and skills do pupils use and develop to explore the content?
- 3. Personal knowledge is where pupils build an awareness of their own presuppositions and values about the beliefs and traditions they are studying. Are pupils aware of the assumptions they bring to the RE classroom? Does RE give them a chance to reflect on their own worldview?

In your planning, do you identify the different ways pupils can be 'knowledgeable' in RE?

The Anglican Church and same-sex marriage

Lambeth 2022: towards an acceptance of different attitudes about same-sex relationships

This summer has seen the <u>Lambeth Conference</u> (2022) taking place; an international meeting of Anglican bishops. On its agenda have been discussions about world affairs and the global mission of the Anglican Communion for the decade ahead.

Amongst other things, this years' conference will be remembered as a watershed when those in favour and those against same-sex relationships accepted they were not going to agree, but found <u>unity in</u> <u>the same Anglican Communion</u>.

Over the past decade the issue of homosexuality and same sex relationships has caused continuing conflict amongst Christians across the worldwide Anglican union. At present churches in Canada, the United States, Brazil and Scotland allow same-sex marriage. Others are considering it. There were seven 'out' gay bishops at Lambeth, some of whom brought their spouses who were not formally invited.

But churches in the Global South — mainly Africa, South America and southeast Asia — are against, believing it to be against the teaching of the Bible. In many of those countries, homosexuality is a crime that carries a sentence of imprisonment or even death.

However, at this conference there seems to be mood change, towards an acceptance that scriptural reasoning leads to different conclusions and that it was not up to the Global North or Global South to dictate to one another.
